THIS WEEK'S BEST BET

The recent spell of mild weather has really sparked spring fever among anglers. And while most fishermen are opting to wait for the start of porgy and fluke season, those with itchy feet are opting for some holdover stripers from the Peconic River or some freshwater fishing from the local lakes and ponds. Bunker and alewives continue to move into the Peconic Estuary. A handful of flounder pounders did line the banks of the Shinnecock Canal on opening day, however no one reported back. Keep in mind that the spring run of weakfish passing through the Shinnecock Canal and into the Peconic Bays are due to show up within the next couple of weeks.

Over at Star Island Yacht Club, John reports the shop is open every day from 7 A.M. to 5 P.M. Fishing remains quiet on the eastern front this week. John did have one boat out when I called on Sunday,

however the fishermen were still out fishing.
